South Bend Local 23 Joins Community in "Rebuilding Together"

ourneymen and apprentices from Roofers & Waterproofers Local 23, South Bend, IN, turned out in droves on April 10, 2010, to replace a homeowner's roof as part of Rebuilding Together's National Rebuilding Day. Rebuilding Together is the nation's leading nonprofit organization working to preserve affordable homeownership by providing free rehabilitation and critical repairs to the homes of low-income, elderly and disabled Americans.

JATC Instructor Drew Holston and International President/former Local 23 Business Agent Don O'Blenis, along with over 35 volunteers, gathered on a Saturday for the roof repair. Level 3, 4 and 5 apprentices received hands-on experience and guidance from the journeymen roofers who shared their knowledge, and together the group replaced the roof for a homeowner who couldn't otherwise afford the fix. All together, 28 homes in the South Bend area—and about 3,500 nationwide— were rehabilitated in April as part of the project.

Rebuilding Together's National Rebuilding Day, held each year in April, mobilizes tens of thousands community volunteers across the country who join national affiliate leaders to repair and restore houses and nonprofit facilities, revitalizing entire communities and aiding families and individuals in need. In addition to roof repair, volunteers provide furnace upgrades, wiring, new paint, yard clean-up and other necessary repairs. National Rebuilding Day has been a tradition in the South Bend area for over 20 years.

Local 54 Roofers Involved in a Very Green Experiment

Volunteers from Seattle Local 54 worked at the University of Washington on an experimental, vegetative roof project this spring. The project was a demonstration of what green roofing is like and how different plants filter rainwater. The School of Botany, the Department of Landscape Architecture and the Green Futures Lab developed the project. Materials were donated by Snyder Roofing of Washington and Columbia Green Technologies of Portland, OR. The project was led by Danielle Pierce of the Department of Landscape Architecture and Doug Ewing, Manager of the Botany Greenhouse.

A 5½-square, corrugated steel shed roof on the university campus was covered with loose laid EPDM and concrete pavers along the outside edge. Next a system of plastic trays were placed on the roof then fitted with an irrigation system. The trays were then filled with a special planting soil mix. Local 54 journeymen Anthony Spires and James Maroney, apprentice Jackie Maples and Apprenticeship Coordinator Gregg Gibeau volunteered for the day working on the roof, putting the trays, irrigation and soil together. Students from the University of Washington did the planting. The experimental roof will have edible plants and vegetables and various plants native to the Northwest growing on top. Students will study how they interact with storm water and affect water quality.
